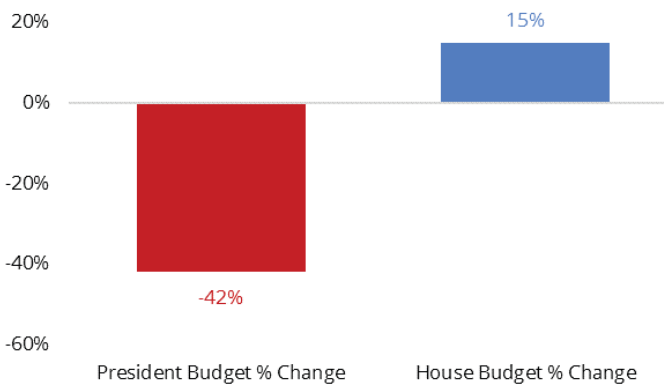


Impact of Federal Grants on Chinese-American Planning Council

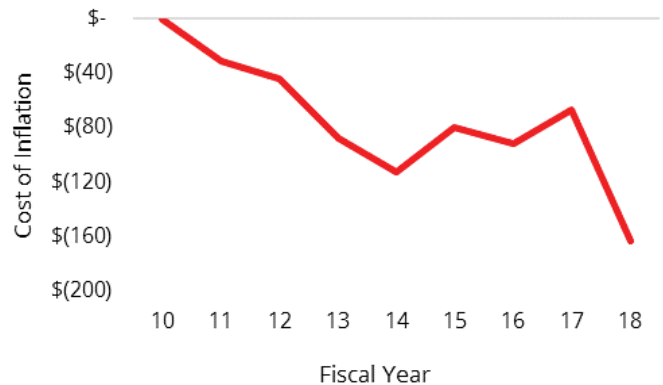
Chinese American-Planning Council (CPC) is the nation's largest American social services organization which serves over 60,000 community members each year through more than 50 programs at over 30 sites throughout New York City. Programs include Early Childhood Education, School-age Care, Workforce Development, Community Services, Senior Services, School-age Care, and Youth Services.

CPC relied on \$5.9 million of funding from 15 federal grants in FY 2018 to provide critical services to their communities

Trump's Budget Would Cut CPC's Federal Grants by 42%, the House Budget Would Boost Them by 15%



CPC's Federal Grants Have Declined by \$164 Million Since FY 2010 After Adjusting for Inflation (\$ in millions)



Trump's budget would cut CPC's federal grants by 42% by eliminating the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG), Social Services Block Grant (SSBG), and the Senior Community Services Employment Program (SCSEP).

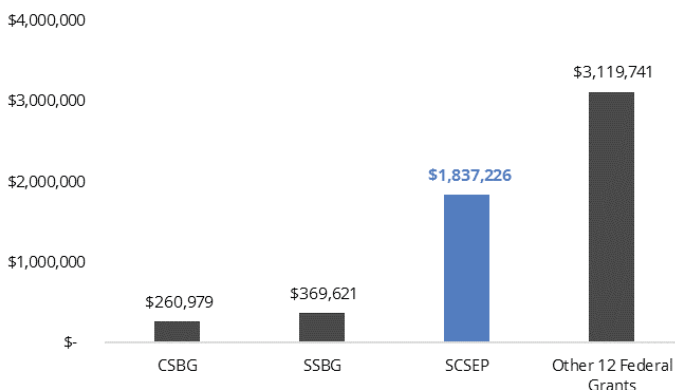
The House budget would increase CPC's grants by 15%, largely due to a 45% increase to the Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG).

* Analysis assumes City would distribute cuts proportionally

CPC's total grants have declined by \$164 million since FY 2010, driven by a \$67 million decline in CCDBG, a \$46 million decline in WIOA Youth Activities, and a \$27 million decline in SSBG.

Featured Program: Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP)

SCSEP Accounted for 10% of CPC's Federal Grants in FY 2018



SCSEP provides skills training and community service assignments to help unemployed, low-income seniors re-enter the workforce.

SCSEP accounted for 10% of the \$5.9 million in federal grants CPC relied on in FY 2018 to support communities in NYC.

SCSEP has fallen by \$3 million (41 percent) since FY 2010 after adjusting for inflation.

In FY 2018, New York City received \$4.5 million in SCSEP federal grant funding.
