

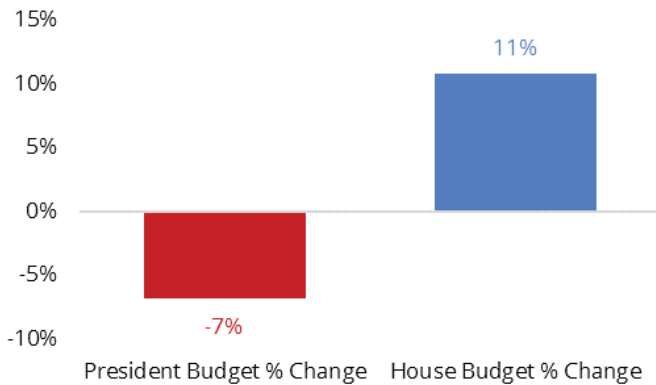


Impact of Federal Grants on East Side House

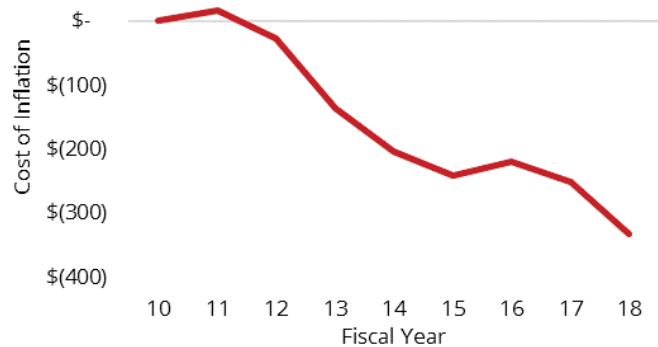
East Side House, established in 1891 on the Upper East Side of Manhattan, provides workforce development and career readiness training infused with technology to enable community participants to improve their economic status and lead more fulfilling lives. Across 29 locations in the South Bronx and Upper Manhattan, East Side House each year serves approximately 10,000 of NYC's most vulnerable people, graduates 1,000 students from its high school and equivalency programs, places 300 people in jobs, and provides 350 adults with tax services.

East Side House relied on \$3.4 million of funding from 8 grants in FY 2018 to provide critical services to their communities

Trump's Budget Would Cut East Side House's Federal Grants by 7%, the House Budget Would Boost Them by 11%



East Side House's Federal Grants Have Fallen by \$333 Million Since FY 2010 After Adjusting for Inflation

Trump's budget would cut East Side House's federal grants by 11% by eliminating the Social Services Block Grant (SSBG) and by the 17% cut to the National Family Caregiver Support Grant (Title III, Part E).

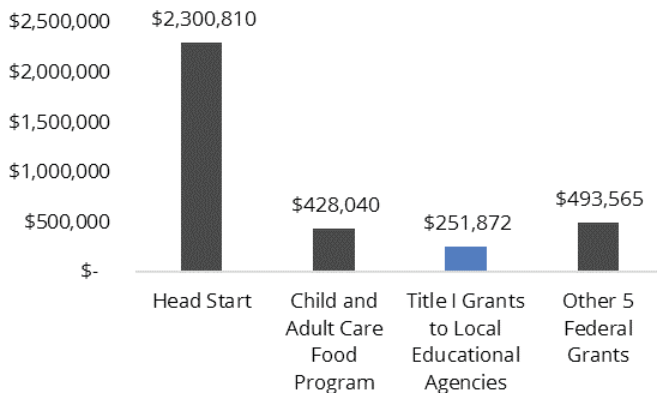
The House budget would increase East Side House's grants by 11%, largely due to a 15% boost to Head Start.

East Side House's total grants have fallen by \$333 million since FY 2010, driven by a \$27 million decline in SSBG.

Featured Grant: Title I Grants to Local Educational Agencies

Title I Grants Accounted for 7% of East Side House's Federal Grants in FY 2018



Title I grants help local educational agencies improve teaching and learning in high-poverty schools, in particular for children failing, or most at-risk of failing.

Title I grants accounted for 7% of the \$3.4 million in federal grants East Side House relied on in FY 2018 to support communities in NYC.

Title I grants have fallen by \$231 million (26%) since FY 2010 after adjusting for inflation.

In FY 2017, East Side House served 1,500 students through Student Support Services program that is funded by Title I. The program allows schools to spend money on services that meet the needs of their specific student population.
